### USS *MONSSEN* (DD-436/DD-798)

Chief Gunner's Mate Mons Monssen was onboard USS *MISSOURI* (BB-11) when a fire erupted inside the magazine of a turret. He crawled in through a scuttle and doused the flames with his hands until a hose was passed to him. For his actions he was awarded the Medal of Honor. Two ships were named in his honor. The first DD-436 was sunk during The Battle of Guadalcanal.

# USS BENNETT (DD-473)

Commissioned: 9 February 1943 Decommissioned: 18 April 1946

Named in honor of Chief Aviation Pilot Floyd Bennett who was the first to fly over the North Pole and back in 1926 with then CDR Richard Byrd. He was awarded the Medal of Honor and commissioned to the warrant rank of Chief Machinist.

## USS REEVES (DE-156)

Commissioned: 9 June 1943 Decommissioned: 13 July 1946

Named in honor of Chief Radioman Thomas J. Reeves who was serving aboard USS *CALIFORNIA* (BB-44) during the attack on Pearl Harbor. In the midst of the fighting Chief Reeves stayed inside the fire and smoke engulfed ship to assist with manual loading of ammunition. He was overcome by the flames and smoke and perished onboard. For his actions he was awarded the Medal of Honor.





# USS PETERSON (DE-152)

Commissioned: 28 September 1943 Decommissioned: June 1965

Named in honor of Chief Water Tender Oscar V. Peterson. Chief Peterson was onboard USS *NEOSHO* (AO-23) during The Battle of Coral Sea. During the battle his ship was hit by devastating aerial fire from Japanese bombers. He led a team of Sailors in the securing of various valves and helped keep the ship afloat. In doing so he sustained multiple injuries to include burns to his face, hands, and shoulders. He and 123 other crew members were rescued by USS *HENLEY* where he perished from his injuries two days later. He was buried at sea off the coast of Australia. For his actions he was awarded the Medal of Honor.







### USS TOMICH (DE-242)

Commissioned: 27 July 1943 Decommissioned: 20 September 1946

Named in honor of Chief Water Tender Peter Tomich. Chief Tomich received the Medal of Honor for his actions onboard USS UTAH (BB-31) during the Attack of Pearl Harbor. When Chief Tomich perished there was nobody to posthumously give his MOH to. He had no next of kin and was unmarried. His Medal was on display in Tomich Hall at the Senior Enlisted Academy until 2006 when it was presented to a distant cousin of his onboard USS ENTERPRISE off the coast of Croatia.











### USS MCFAUL (DDG-74)

Commissioned: 25 April 1998

Homeport: Norfolk, VA

Named in honor of ENC (SEAL) Donald L. McFaul who was killed in action during OPERATION JUST CAUSE the 1989 invasion of Panama. Chief McFaul ran into enemy fire to evacuate a wounded comrade. In doing so he was mortally wounded. For his actions he was awarded the Navy Cross.









# USS JOHN FINN (DDG-113)



#### Commissioned: 15 July 2019

Homeport: San Diego, CA

Named in honor of ACOM John Finn for his heroic actions during the Japanese attack of Pearl Harbor 7 Dec 1941. He was the first of the US Armed Forces to be awarded the MOH for WWII. He was also the only one out of 15 who received the award for valor under attack. The rest of the awardees were for rescue operations.











### USS DELBERT D. BLACK (DDG-119)



Commissioned: 26 September 2020 Homeport: Mayport, FL

Named in honor of MCPON Delbert Black. First Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy. A Gunners Mate by trade. Stationed aboard the USS *MARYLAND* (BB-46) and was onboard during the attack on Pearl Harbor. He was the first enlisted Sailor to be awarded the Navy Distinguished Service Medal.







USNS CARL BRASHEAR (T-AKE-7)

In service: 4 March 2009

Named in honor of BMCM (MDV) Carl Brashear. The first African-American Master Diver and first amputee restored to full active duty. Master Chief Brashear was the epitome of perseverance and resiliency







#### Commissioned: 21 October 1995 Homeport: San Diego, CA

Named after Honorary Master Chief Constructionman Robert Stethem who was onboard TWA Flight 847 when hijackers took Stethem and 39 other civilians hostage. He was tortured and eventually shot in the temple. Throughout the event he remained silent and did not feed into their demands. For his actions he was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star and Prisoner of War Medal.







# USS JAMES E. WILLIAMS (DDG-95)

#### Commissioned: 11 December 2004 Homeport: Norfolk, VA

Named after Honorary Chief Boatswain Mate James E. Williams. Williams led a PBR patrol into enemy terrain and is credited for the damage and destruction of 65 sampans and junks. For his actions he was awarded the the Medal of Honor, Navy Cross, two Silver Stars, three Purple Hearts and many other meritorious awards during his 20 year career spanning Korea and Vietnam conflicts. He is recognized as the most decorated enlisted Sailor in the history of the United States Navy.







USS *MICHAEL MONSOOR* (DDG-1001)



Commissioned: 26 January 2019 Homeport: San Diego, CA

Named after Honorary Chief Petty Officer Michael Monsoor. He was killed during Operation Iraqi Freedom 26 September 2006 when he hurled himself on a grenade to protect his comrades. For his actions he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor.

### USS HILL (DE-141)

#### Commissioned: 21 December 1942 Decommissioned: 7 June 1946

Named in honor of Chief Boatswain Edwin J. Hill who was serving aboard USS NEVADA (BB-36) during the attack on Pearl Harbor. The NEVADA was the only Battleship to get underway during the attack in large part to his efforts. He dove off the fantail, swam ashore and undid the mooring line. As the ship steamed out he again jumped in, swam back to the ship climbed aboard and resumed his duties. The ship took heavy enemy fire and his body was found riddled with bullet wounds. For his actions he was awarded the Medal of Honor.
